Warrington charity win Cheshire High Sheriff's Award for Enterprise 2019

LOCAL charity Warrington Disability Partnership is celebrating after winning the Cheshire High Sheriff's Award for Enterprise.

More than 300 guests gathered at Chester Racecourse to celebrate the crème de la crème of the region's business community at the prestigious annual Cheshire High Sheriff's Awards for Enterprise.

Hosted by the High Sheriff of Cheshire, Alexis Redmond MBE, and the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Chester, Professor Tim Wheeler, the guest speakers during the evening were Roger Johnson from BBC North West Tonight and Phil Redmond, TV producer and screenwriter, who delighted the audience with their conversation and stories.

Warrington Disability Partnership (WDP) scooped the overall prize, the Cheshire High Sheriff's Award for Enterprise 2018/19, sponsored by White Oak UK, WDP is a locally based and internationally-acclaimed, userled, pan-disability charity. During the past 28 years they have developed and now deliver 28 mobility and independent living services aimed at supporting disabled people and people living with long-term health conditions. Award judges found this company amazing and inspirational for its achievements.

Dave Thompson, MBE DL, Co-Founder and Chief Executive at WDP, said "It was an absolute honour to have reached the shortlist in our category, and when it was announced that we had won, it felt utterly amazing.

"As a medium-sized charity, we knew that we had to adopt business strategies in order to survive the past few years of austerity which has resulted in years of cuts in grants and contracts with statutory services. We have worked hard to find the balance between the use of business acumen needed to develop a hugely successful trading arm, the Disability Trading Company, and the values-based ethical philosophy of our charity.

Oxford undergraduate's inspirational message to Warrington students

AN undergraduate is encouraging other young people from Warrington to aim high as he finishes his law degree at Oxford University.

Greg Horne, who studied A-Levels at Priestley College, is planning to become a barrister after his time at Christ Church is complete.

In a video message recorded for prospective new Priestley students, the former Lymm High School pupil said he had not considered Oxford an option until he went to college.

"My advice to anyone going through A-Levels is to believe in yourself because people are capable of so much more than they realise," he said.

"Just having an enormous amount of heart and being willing to shoot for the stars with everything that you do would be my advice because the higher you aim the more you achieve."

Greg, who coxes one of Oxford's rowing teams, left high school with A*s, As and Bs, but never believed that would be enough to get him into Oxbridge.

However, after he joined Priestley's Graduate programme and visited Oxford with others aiming to study at a Russell Group university he realised a place was within reach.


"I found out that the focus wasn't just about my grades. At the interview you are asked deeper thinking questions just to figure out how your mind works and the sort of logic you have," said Greg.

"It was the way I responded that made the difference to them in terms of giving me an offer."

Greg's inspiring message is being shown to any prospective Priestley student to prove what they can achieve. Since going to Oxford he has also returned to Priestley to offer advice and guidance to the current cohort on how to secure university places.

Senior Tutor Mark Salmon said a lot of work was taking place between Priestley College and the UK's leading universities to ensure young people in Warrington saw them as obtainable.

"There is still in issue with young people across the North West not believing that Oxbridge or Russell Group universities are for them, but Greg's story – and that of countless others – proves this is not the case," he said.

Jobs and pay continue to rise as British employers keep on hiring

JOBS and pay continue to rise as the employment miracle ignored Brexit to hit new record levels.

A record 32.7m people were in work in the three months to February, a rise of 179,000 on the previous three months and a jump of 457,000 on the year.

The quality of jobs improved as most of the increase came in full time employment.

Unemployment fell by 27,000 on the quarter and 76,000 on the year with jobless holding steady at 3.9pc, the joint-lowest rate since the midseventies

Total pay including bonuses now averaged £494 a week compare with £525 in February 2008.

It was feared the political turmoil over Brexit could have an effect on hiring but the Office of National Statistics found 852,000 unfilled job vacancies in March, close to a record high.

Record number of EU nationals working in the UK

The number of EU nationals working in the UK hit a record high in the three months to March as the jobs market continues to expand.

Nearly 2.4m citizens of other EU nations now work here a rise of 100,000 on the final three months of 2018. It vastly exceeds the outflow from late 2017 to September 2018.

The total number of non-EU workers also increased, the office for National Statistics (ONS) said by 22,000 on the quarter and 80,000 on the year to more than 1.3m overall the period compared to 3.8pc for non-disabled people.

unemployment fell to 3.8pc its lowest since the end of 1974.

Employment grew by 99,000 on the quarter and 354,000 in the past 12 months to 34m. The employment rate is a record 76.1pc with just 1.3m unemployed.

Employers have had to increase wages and offer more benefits to compete for British workers as European migrants shun the UK in the run up to Brexit.

Three guarters of recruiters have seen an increase in businesses looking to source candidates from within the country according to research by Linked In.

She said: "As students in the north west, selective and competitive universities such as Oxford and Cambridge can feel like unrealistic goals.

"However the programme, along with the trip to Oxford, has helped us see these universities as places we can aspire to study in." For former Cardinal Newman RC High School pupil Ewan Craven the Pembroke North programme has allowed him to develop valuable skills such as critical reading.

"The academic literature that has been given to us is very challenging, but I have developed the skills needed to follow a difficult text and to critically analyse a hard piece of work," he said.

All the Priestley students also take part in the college's Graduate programme, which is designed to make them as competitive as possible when applying for top university places.

Death of Freeman of Warrington Norman Banner MBE

Freeman of Warrington Norman Banner MBE has died aged 71 after a near two year battle with cancer.

Born and bred in Warrington, Norman, who recently retired as solicitor with FDR Law was well known and hugely respected across the town for his various charitable and community roles spanning more than 50 years.

He leaves wife Louise and his sons Mark (21) and Edward (15).

His voluntary work began over 50 years ago when he built and ran up the Youth Club at Grappenhall Independent Methodist Church for a number of years.

After graduating in law from Manchester Polytechnic, Norman joined Robert Davies & Co and served a total of over 48 years with one or other of the component firms that comprise FDR Law. He became a partner in the practice and rose to Senior Partner before retiring from the partnership at 65 continuing as a consultant solicitor with the firm until earlier this year.

Shortly after qualifying Norman was approached by well known local head teacher, magistrate and charity champion Marjorie Griffiths and was invited to join the recently formed Warrington Committee for Disabled People, an umbrella group representing local charities and statutory colleagues to encourage collaborative work and an improvement to the provisions for people with a disability.

Norman chaired the committee for many years and out of their work was formed Warrington Crossroads Care Attendant Scheme which Norman also chaired and from which he also obtained the full funding for the first single occupancy vehicle with a tail-lift for Warrington Community Transport.

Involvement with Crossroads Care took Norman onto the national board which he also chaired for 10 years. Crossroads was based in Rugby and apart from monthly meetings, Norman spent many evenings addressing the AGMs of member schemes across the UK, visited schemes in Scotland, Ireland and the Netherlands and attended and hosted many events in London including three receptions at No. 10 Downing Street. His weekday Crossroads commitments were taken as annual leave from his legal work.

Crossroads Care grew under his chairmanship from around 50 schemes to over 200 at the time of his retirement.

Following Crossroads, Sir Donald Wilson the chair of the Regional Health Authority invited Norman to sit on the board of the authority following which he appointed him as the first chair of Warrington Hospital Trust which office Norman held for 12 years, the last four following the merger with Halton.

It was in the first weeks of the Trust that Warrington Hospital was at the centre of the town's brave response to the IRA bombing.

For 10 years Norman was on the board of St Rocco's Hospice for most of that time as Chair.

For the last few years he served as a Deputy Lieutenant of Cheshire and

was a founder member of Cheshire Community Foundation where he was able to assist in the creation of a $\pm 1m + trust$ fund for the benefit of projects for elderly people ringfenced for Warrington.

In 2016 he was awarded the inaugural Lifetime Achievement Award at the Warrington Business Awards.

There were many other local voluntary and statutory organisations that Norman has been involved with including the Warrington Festival Trust and Warrington Community Health Council.



College celebrates top 10 ranking for third consecutive year

WARRINGTON & Vale Royal College is celebrating some of the highest pass rates in England, with the latest figures ranking it in the top 10 colleges nationally for the third consecutive year.

Lib Dem Cllr Wendy Johnson has been elected as the 136th Mayor of Warrington – and only the 11th woman to hold the office, following in the footsteps of retiring Mayor Cllr Karen Mundry.

But with Labour's Maureen Creaghan elected as her deputy, the balance is gradually being readdressed at the town hall - and means when the Deputy Mayor succeeds as Mayor next year, it will be the first time is Warrington's history that three women will have served consecutively as Mayor.

Cllr Johnson, who represents Lymm North & Thelwall has chosen Warrington Disability Partnership, Walton Lea Project, MacIntyre and Contact the Elderly as her charities for the year.

Born in Warrington at Great Sankey, she moved to Thelwall aged one.

In nominating Cllr Johnson, fellow Cllr Bob Barr said it was quite appropriate that she was becoming Mayor at the time the Golden Gates were being renovated. Her grandfather had been a planner at the town hall and was involved in the project the last time the gates had been restored.

She has served on a range of committees and working groups and has particularly enjoyed her time as the Chairperson of the Health and Wellbeing Overview and Scrutiny Committee. She will be focusing on two themes in particular, tolerance and homelessness, in her year as Mayor.

Cllr Johnson said, "I have been a long-serving council member since I first joined in 1998. To now succeed to the role of Mayor of Warrington is an honour.

"I look forward to the year ahead and being able to support the charities under the Mayor's Appeal. I'm excited to get out and meet all the different residents of Warrington and to take on the new responsibilities of the mayoral role."

Her sister, Beverley Hallam, will be the Mayor's consort and support her throughout her mayoral year.





Universities set sights on Priestley students

UNIVERSITIES have lowered their grade requirements for students who have successfully completed the Extended Project at Priestley College.

Grace Duffy, who achieved an A* with her dissertation on the bleaching of the coral reefs, had her original offer from Birmingham reduced from an A to a B in each A-Level on the strength of her project.

"It is great news for me because Birmingham was my first choice to study a Masters in Geology with a year abroad," said the former Penketh High pupil.

"I wanted to do my best in the EPQ anyway, but it definitely gave me more motivation knowing it could influence my offer."

The Extended Project allows

students to choose their own topics and titles, which have been as varied as 'Are humans really made of stardust?' to 'What makes the perfect pop song?'

Most students complete a dissertation of at least 6,000 words. Students can opt to complete an investigation, experiment, field study, performance or an artefact plus 2,000 words instead.

Many universities reduce offers for successful EPQ candidates because it demonstrates a number of key skills including the ability to learn independently.

Almost half of the students who take the course alongside their other A-Levels and BTECs at Priestley secure A* or A, two thirds achieve a grade B or above.

Daniel James also completed his EPQ early and received a reduced university offer.

At Priestley he is studying Classical Civilisation, History, English Language and Literature and has now accepted an offer to study Ancient History at the University of Manchester.


However, it was the University of Liverpool that lowered its grade requirements after he achieved an A in his EPQ, which was about how Julius Caesar became so powerful he could claim to be a dictator for life.

"EPQ has helped me to develop numerous skills like the ability to collate and critically analyse a selection of useful sources and giving an effective and efficient presentation," he said. "Delivering my presentation also greatly increased my confidence when presenting to, or speaking in front of, a group."

For aspiring chemical engineer Ben Hilton, the Extended Project was a chance to write about a vast area of research in his chosen field.

He investigated whether hydrogen fuel cells are the best option to power transport. The A* grade he achieved meant that one of his grade requirements for studying Chemical Engineering at university was reduced from an A to B.

"I thought an EPQ would be helpful, as it would give me an academic topic to talk about at length in an interview," said the former St Gregory's Catholic High School pupil.

Thornton Professor leads the North West on hydrogen matters

WITH the North West aiming to deliver the UK's first hydrogen economy, a University of Chester professor is leading the way in the region's ambition to make that vision a reality.

Among his many regional and national roles focussing on clean energy, Professor Joe Howe, Executive Director of the Thornton Energy Institute at the University of Chester, is Chair of the North West Hydrogen Alliance. NWHA is a new industrial partnership backing the region's primary hydrogen economy bid.

Pioneering

Joe will be one of the keynote speakers and co-chair of 'Delivering the Hydrogen Economy North West', a region-wide event which will bring together key stakeholders to discuss how the region can deliver pioneering hydrogen projects that set the standard for the UK. It will also showcase the extensive range of hydrogen projects that are already happening in the North West. The aim is to develop hydrogen regionally as a key part of the Government's Industrial Strategy.

'Delivering the Hydrogen Economy NW' will feature talks and presentations from Liverpool City Region Mayor, Steve Rotheram, as well as some of the region's key players in the energy industry, including INOVYN, BOC Gases, Peel Environmental and Costain. Delegates will hear how the region has committed £500m to meet the challenge of becoming the UK's first zero carbon cluster by 2040.

Expertise

Professor Howe has also recently been announced as a member of an advisory board for the All Party Parliamentary Group for Carbon Capture and Storage (CCUS). The advisory board has been established to provide expertise and guidance for the APPG's enquiry, which will examine the benefits and value of CCUS and what is required to commercialise the technology in the UK. It also includes representatives from heavy industry, academia, think tanks and non-governmental organisations (NGOs).

Professor Joe Howe said: "When pure hydrogen is combined with oxygen and burned, it produces only heat and water – with no harmful CO2 emissions. Here at the University of Chester, we believe that Thornton Science Park is a, if not the, pivotal feature for the further development of the

hydrogen economy in the North West. To use an energy metaphor, we see our Energy Centre as our beacon at Thornton, which is a Campus all about skills, innovation and clean growth. Hydrogen is exactly that: an energy source to deliver clean growth for businesses and people (through car fuel, for example). I am extremely excited that the University of Chester is at the heart of such an exciting future prospect."

Innovation

Professor Howe has undertaken extensive energy related research, development and innovation funded by Government, Industry and RCUK (Research Councils UK) and the EU and has published in excess of 100 peer reviewed articles. Specifically on energy systems, he has led and been involved in the development of industry/ university partnerships including BAE Systems and the National Nuclear Laboratory, where he is an academic associate.

During the last six years, he has been successful in securing six energy related EPSRC Industrial Collaborative PhD funded students and has been either PI (Principal Investigator) or CI (Co-investigator) on several energy specific ERDF programmes supporting SMEs in the North West of England. He has recently completed two Innovate UK projects concerned with Carbon Capture and Storage and Nuclear Decommissioning respectively and is currently leading on two industrial sponsored energy research projects funded by URENCO and Costain.

Collaboration

Among his research projects, Professor Howe is supporting award winning PhD student Reace Edwards, who is exploring how hydrogen can be used to decarbonise gas in the region. Funded by Costain, the smart infrastructure solutions company, Reace's work is part of a collaboration research project on decarbonising gas that has been signed between Costain and the University of Chester.

However, the second opportunity arose after Karlton captained the Priestley College Academy team, which is run in partnership with Warrington Wolves.


"I know there are people who would

However, it was joining Priestley College's rugby team that led to his second chance.

Discipline

Wolves coaches Lee Mitchell and Lee Westwood work with students in the Cat 3 academy to develop all aspects of their game and Karlton benefitted from the added discipline he developed.

It was during a match against Wigan's Cat 3 academy that Karlton impressed Wolves' Head of Youth Peter Riding who invited him in to discuss his future.

"I turned up with my boots, kit and

bottle of water so that if he asked me to training again I was ready to start straight away and that's what happened," said Karlton.

"When I was told I had a contract I was like a kid at Christmas because it is something I have been working so hard for.'

Lee Mitchell said Karlton was a prime example of how Priestley's academy aimed to give players a second chance or the opportunity to be discovered for the first time.

"Rugby is a late maturation sport and some players can be missed if they don't develop until late," he said.

"Thanks to the academy we are already seeing lads develop a greater love for the sport and more of them are going out to play in the local community.

"We will try our best to keep as many of them to take us forward, and we will be trying to keep it together."

Their first new signing for next season was the capture of Gainsborough midfielder Alex Byrne.
